PROGRESS: ARE STUDENTS MAKING SUFFICIENT PROGRESS?

F.B. Leon Guerrero Middle School students continue to make progress in improving school culture and academics. The teachers, students, staff and administration present data to students as well as incorporate lessons on character to help decrease disciplinary infractions. The school continues to work on school improvement focusing on the accreditation process to improve the unified planning of instruction, delivery and assessment.

Due to alignment with the National Public Education Financial Survey (NPEFS), they are significantly different from the SY 14-15 SPRC expenditure figures.

The school has implemented Academic and Behavioral SMART Goals, actively developing and implementing Curriculum Guides that are aligned with the Common Core State Standards and SAT10 Priority Skills, the school continues to develop and implement Common Formative/Summative Assessments to determine students' skills acquisition and effectuate change in instruction to include a School-Wide Lesson Plan that emulates Marzano's Module, implementation of PLC's both in both the Content Area and Team to achieve a common goal by looking at student data to strategize and implement effect teaching methods towards student achievement, and lastly Mini-Observations in the classroom are done by all school Administrators to assure that effective teaching is taking place.

ENVIRONMENT: IS THE SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT SUPPORTING STUDENTS, TEACHERS, & FAMILIES?

The school has implemented *PBIS* to include designating 30 minutes of the day every day in our *Team Time* period to implement our ABC (Activities that Build Character) lessons. The ABC implementation in Team Time supports the students with regards to building positive character.

Teachers have been provided professional development in CITW, the Big 8 Strategies, and various Curricular Professional Development provided by the District to support the teacher's implementation of their lessons and teaching effectiveness.

The school continues to work collaboratively with the Parent-Teacher Organization to effectively communicate with our parents.

OUTCOMES: WHAT ARE STUDENTS ACCOMPLISHING?

The **School Improvement Plan (SIP)** is aligned with the **5 District Goals** and the **District Strategic Plan**. Through the continued implementation of these 5 District Goals and the District Strategic Plan, students will continue to progress academically and socially. FBLG continues to review the School Improvement Plan (SIP) to make revisions and changes to meet the academic and behavioral needs of our students. 
